

"In 2013, when Canadian Ambassador Nicholas Coghlan and his spouse Jennifer were posted to South Sudan, there was a sudden, violent ethnic uprising. After the Canadian embassy closed, the Coghlans stayed behind, working from their truck outside of the Juba International Airport to help over 300 Canadians flee the country. As a result of their commitment, many lives were saved."

Nicolas Coghlan was the head of the Canadian mission in Juba when violence erupted in December 2013. With 300 Canadians needing to evacuate, Coghlan quickly began negotiating for space on American, British and European flights. In the crushing heat, out of the office vehicle, under a Canadian flag, in the airport parking lot, he and his wife identified Canadians and got them on outbound flights. Even once evacuated to Kenya, he continued to arrange for the UN to move Canadians from remote hot spots. He regularly travelled to Juba to make sure the job got done. He and his wife returned South Sudan when the Embassy was reopened in 2014 and this time he was the Ambassador.

"Racing against time in response to the devastating Ebola outbreaks in West Africa, Heinrich Feldmann and Gary Kobinger developed the first effective vaccine and treatment used to protect front-line care providers. The vaccine has since proven highly effective, with a perfect track record of protection that has resulted in a major leap toward the eradication of this deadly virus."

A Canadian-developed vaccine for the Ebola virus has proven to be extremely effective in a full-scale clinical trial, opening the possibility that future outbreaks of the disease can be successfully contained.

The trial, led by the World Health Organization, was staged in Guinea, a country that was ravaged by the Ebola epidemic that swept across West Africa in 2014-2015.

Awarded the **Order of Manitoba (OM)** in 2016 for his work as an Ebola Researcher at the National Microbiology Laboratory in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

The Meritorious Service Cross awarded to Heinrich Feldmann will be presented to him at a later date.

Heinz Feldmann graduated from medical school in 1987 (M.D.) and received his Ph.D. in 1988, both from the University of Marburg, Germany. His postdoctoral research was conducted in the field of virology (filoviruses and hantaviruses) at the Institute of Virology, University of Marburg, Germany, and the special pathogens branch at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta, where he held a fellowship from the National Research Council. Following his postdoctoral training, he was as an assistant and associate professor with the Institute of Virology at the University of Marburg, Germany. During this time he was trained as an infectious disease specialist with a focus on laboratory diagnostics. From 1999 to 2008, Dr. Feldmann held the position of chief of the special pathogens program of the National Microbiology Laboratory, Public Health Agency of Canada. Since 2008, he has been the chief of Laboratory of Virology and the chief scientist at the RML BSL-4 laboratories. In addition, he is an associate professor with the department of medical microbiology, University of Manitoba. Dr. Feldmann is a laboratory expert



on high containment viruses (BSL-4) and serves as a consultant on viral hemorrhagic fevers and related pathogens for the World Health Organization and, thus, has field experience and expertise in outbreak management. He is a member of national and international professional societies, and serves on the editorial board of several journals, as well as being an invited reviewer for multiple journals from related fields. Dr. Feldmann is an external scientific reviewer for national and international organizations and serves as a scientific consultant for high containment laboratories. His professional interest is in the pathogenesis of hemorrhagic fever viruses, such as filoviruses, arenaviruses and bunyaviruses, and other emerging viral pathogens (containment level BSL-3 and BSL-4) and the development of countermeasures against those pathogens.

Advocate for Homeless in Vancouver

"Judy Graves designed and led the Vancouver Homeless Outreach Project, a program that helps homeless individuals secure a regular source of income and stable housing. Her model, based on compassion and respect, has changed how communities across the province approach homelessness and is the culmination of 30 years spent helping people living on the street to rebuild their lives."

From 2010 to 2013, Graves was employed by the City of Vancouver as its official advocate for the homeless. Before that, she worked as its tenant-assistance coordinator. For more than three decades, Graces has been spotted walking Vancouver streets,

often by herself and late at night, offering a helping hand to anybody she finds there in need of assistance.



In January 2014, the Vancouver recognized Graves' lifetime efforts in support of homeless people with the Freedom of the City award, its top honour. "Throughout her 33-year career with the City of Vancouver, Judy Graves cultivated caring connections with people living on the streets and in shelters and served as a tireless advocate on behalf of those marginalized by homelessness," a city website reads. "Graves approached her work in a deeply personal way, walking the streets of Vancouver in all kinds of weather and at all hours of the night, reaching out to people living on the streets and listening to their stories, while helping them navigate the delicate process of rebuilding their lives."

Michael Kaufman, MSC, PhD

Michael Kaufman is a public speaker, writer, and consultant, whose innovative approaches to engage men and boys in promoting gender equality and transforming men's lives has taken him around the world over the past three decades. He has worked extensively with the United Nations and with governments, non-governmental organizations, corporations, trade unions, and universities.

Michael is the co-founder of the White Ribbon Campaign, the largest effort in the world of men working to end violence against women. He is a senior fellow at Instituto Promundo (Washington D.C. and Rio de Janiero) and co-writer of the *State of the Worlds' Fathers Report*.


His work in the UN system, including with UN WOMEN, UNFPA, UNICEF, UNDP, IFAD, and UNESCO has taken him to New York, Rome, Paris, Beijing, Katmandu, Ankara, Geneva, Nairobi, Jakarta, and Delhi. He has worked with numerous NGOs including OXFAM, International Red Cross, Save the Children, and Amnesty International, as well as with governments on six continents. He wrote the training program on sexual harassment used by tens of thousands of staff at the United Nations. He is the author or editor of eight books on gender issues, on democracy and development studies, and an award-winning novel, *The Possibility of Dreaming on a Night Without Stars.* His most recent novel is the anti-war tale, *The Afghan Vampires Book Club.* His articles, which

have appeared in newspapers, magazines, and journals around the world, have been translated into Spanish, French, German, Portuguese, Italian, Finnish, Estonian, Russian, Persian, Chinese, Japanese, Hungarian, Turkish, and Arabic.

He has worked across Canada and the United States; in Europe (Norway, Sweden, Finland, Denmark, Iceland, Holland, Belgium, England, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, France, Switzerland, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Turkey, Germany, Austria, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Georgia, and Russia); Latin America and the Caribbean (Mexico, Jamaica, Trinidad, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Haiti, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Brazil, Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador); Africa (Namibia, Kenya, South Africa): Asia and Australia (Japan, China, South Korea, Philippines, India, Indonesia, Singapore, Malaysia, Nepal, Australia, New Zealand.)

Michael previously taught at York University in Toronto where he was Deputy Director of the Centre for Research on Latin America and the Caribbean. He lives in Toronto, Canada, is married, and has a grown daughter and son. He received his MSC on 12 December 2017.





Jack Layton was born in Montréal on 18 July 1950 and died in Toronto on 22 August 2011. Jack graduated in political science from McGill University with a BA (1970) and from York University with an MA (1971) and a PhD (1984). His PhD thesis dealt with globalization. Layton taught at Ryerson Polytechnic, York University and the University of Toronto. Along with Olivia Chow, his wife and fellow councillor, Layton served as a Toronto city councillor (1982-1991 and 1994-2003) and was part of a coalition of NDPers and progressives. Layton placed second in the Toronto mayoralty race in 1991 and ran unsuccessfully as a federal NDP candidate for Parliament in 1993 and 1997. He served on the federal board of the Climate Change Protection Program (1998-2001) and as president of the Canadian Federation of Municipalities (2001-2002).

Jack was the leader of the federal New Democratic Party from 2003-2011, headed the first NDP party to sit as Canada's Official Opposition in the House of Commons. Despite having no seat in Parliament, Layton entered the 2003 federal NDP leadership race and won a

convincing first-ballot victory over 5 rivals, including 3 sitting MPs becoming leader on 25 January 2003. In the 2004 election, the party almost doubled its votes and Jack won his seat in Toronto. The 2004-2005 Parliament was a minority Liberal government and the NDP were able to get some of their social and infrastructure programs funded. The same-sex marriage legislation was passed in this Parliament. In the 2006 election, Jack's wife Olivia Chow, was also elected to Parliament. They were both elected again in 2008. In February 2010, Jack Layton announced that he had prostate cancer. The minority Conservative government was defeated on a confidence motion in March 2011 and on 02 May 2011 won the NDP won their most seats in the House of Commands and became the Official Opposition. Unfortunately, while he campaigned very well in the election and took his place as the Leader of the Opposition, in July 2011 he had to take a temporary leave of his parliamentary duties and died on 22 August 2011.

Joseph Maloney, MSC



Joseph Maloney is the International Vice President for all of Canada of the International Brotherhood of Boilermakers. He previously served as International Vice President for Western Canada and assumed the jurisdictional responsibility for the entire nation upon the retirement of Eastern Canada Vice President Ed Power on July 1, 2014, by action of the International Executive Council.

Maloney was unanimously elected to the Executive Council in 2005 and reelected at the last two Consolidated Conventions, in 2006 and 2011. He joined Local 128 in 1974. As a graduate apprentice, Maloney worked as a fitter and rigger. He served Local 128 in numerous capacities from steward to president and finally as business manager. In 1991, he was appointed to serve as an International Rep for Eastern Canada. Two years later, he left the Brotherhood to work for the Building & Construction

Trades Department (BCTD) in the Canadian office as Assistant to the Executive Secretary. In 1998, Maloney became the BCTD's Director of Canadian Affairs, and in 2000 he was elected to serve as BCTD Secretary-Treasurer under President Edward C. Sullivan.

While serving in that capacity, Maloney helped spearhead the U.S. Helmets to Hardhats (H2H) program, which seeks to transition military veterans to civilian jobs in the construction trades. As the Boilermakers' IVP for Western Canada, he also led the effort to bring the H2H program to Canada.

"Norman Rolston invented his Able Walker in 1986 to help his aunt, whose mobility was limited by arthritis. After witnessing the health benefits of this innovative walker, Mr. Rolston chose not to patent his invention so that it could be freely copied at need. He also donated many models to organizations assisting people with disabilities. Thanks to him, the Able Walker has restored independence and mobility to many people and improved their quality of life."

Awarded the Order of British Columbia (OBC) in 2015.

His Citation reads:

Norman Rolston works as a counsellor, dedicated to the needs of those less fortunate than himself. His invention of the Able Walker has saved the taxpayers millions of dollars by giving many immobile individuals a way to be active for better mental and physical health.



Norman built his first walker for his aunt who suffered from arthritis. One day in 1986, while watching her trying to walk across the floor pushing a kitchen chair, he had an idea to attach wheels. His prototype walker included swivel casters for steering and hand brakes to give his aunt renewed freedom and independence.

The biggest challenge was overcoming the skepticism of the medical profession but Norman was undaunted. He met with the Surgeon General of the United States who thought highly of the invention. Following that meeting, the medical profession took a renewed interest in Norman's device. Doctors soon had patients who could never before attend their clinics come in with their Able Walkers, confident and mobile.

Unselfishly, Norman decided to gift his invention to the world by not patenting it. For this, he won the first Humanitarian of the Year Award presented by the International Society of Inventors.

Easily customizable, the program has been adapted for use by people of all ages with differing needs in many countries around the world."

Called the Virtual Musical Instrument, the computer program enables almost anyone to make music – including people with any level of physical disability. The virtual instrument works with any standard computer and webcam. On the screen, budding musicians see their own image, on which are superimposed coloured shapes representing different notes, chords or entire bars of music. The camera captures movement over these shapes – whether it's the waving of an arm, nodding of the head or even blinking of an eye – and translates it into musical sounds, which can be programmed to sound like any of 128 instruments.

The invention combines Wan's two loves: computer programming and music. In 1996 he was a healthy, violinplaying, 18-year-old computer whiz when he suddenly developed transverse myelitis, an inflammation of the spinal cord's nerve sheath. Wan spent four months on life support before gradually learning to breathe consciously. He now uses a ventilator only at night.

Three years after becoming quadriplegic, Wan started taking computer-engineering courses part time at the University of Toronto. "I just did it out of interest, not to pursue a degree," he says. For many years, he has relied on a computer system with a head-tracking device. A camera on top of his screen tracks the movement of a sensor on his eyeglasses. Moving his head moves the cursor and lingering for more than a quarter of a second clicks it. "I'm able to control the mouse cursor as efficiently as a healthy person," says Wan. He graduated with a bachelor of applied science in 2010, 11 years after he began.

For his undergraduate thesis, Wan used a vocal sensing switch to allow people with severe physical disabilities to control a power wheelchair with their voice. For his master's degree, Wan is designing a new technology for people who are unable to move or speak that translates thoughts into functional activities, such as turning a light on or off or indicating yes or no.

But it's the virtual musical instrument that continues to make headlines. Last October, the four-member design team – senior scientist Tom Chau, music therapist Andrea Lamont and engineers Wan and Pierre Duez – travelled to Dearborn, Michigan, to receive the da Vinci award, the equivalent of an Oscar for adaptive and assistive technology. It was the first time Wan had been on a plane since coming to Canada from Hong Kong as a 10-year-old.



James Michael Flaherty, PC, MSC

Jim Flaherty was born on 30 December 1949 in Lachine, Quebec. He obtained his law degree at Osgoode Hall and practiced law for 20 members before moving to politics. Jim was the Member of Ontario Provincial Parliament for Whitby-Ajax from 1995 until 2005 serving as Ontario Provincial Minister of Finance from 2001 to 2002. Twice he unsuccessfully stood for the Ontario Progressive Conservative Party leadership. He moved to federal politics and won the riding of Whitby-Oshawa in the federal election of 23 January 2006 as a member of the Conservative Party of Canada. He was re-elected in 2008 and 2011 and served as Canada's federal Minister of Finance from 2006 to 2014. He resigned as Finance Minister on 18 March 2014 and died while a sitting MP on 10 April 2014. Jim Flaherty's widow, Christine Elliott, represented Whitby-Oshawa in the Ontario legislature until her resignation in August 2015.

Elliott was born in Oshawa on 13 April 1955 and grew up in Whitby. She attended the University of Western Ontario received her Bachelor of Laws degree in 1978. She was called to the Ontario Bar in 1980 was a founding member and partner of the Whitby law firm *Flaherty Dow Elliott & McCarthy*, where she practised in real estate, corporate/commercial and estate law. In March 2006, Elliott ran as the Progressive Conservative candidate in the provincial riding of Whitby—Ajax in a by-election, replacing her husband who was elected to the federal Parliament. She was re-elected in 2007 in the redistributed riding of Whitby—Oshawa. She was re-elected in 2011 and 2014 and resigned in August 2015. She was the PC Party's Deputy Leader from 2009 to 2015. She had triplets in 1991 – three sons. From an interview when asked to tell a joke she told this one: "Jim would say he asked me: "In your wildest dreams, did you ever think I'd be finance minister of Canada? And I would reply, Jim, you aren't in my wildest dreams."

It all began in 2000 with Sister Alice Mputsoe, a student from Lesotho in my graduate class in the Faculty of Education at the University of Ottawa, Canada. I had never heard of her beautiful country. In our many discussions, Sr. Alice taught me about her people and their suffering from AIDS, poverty and famine. At that time, Lesotho was on the verge of extinction – people were dying, children were orphaned, villages were forgotten and families were destroyed. Her tale of such suffering haunted me for years.

In 2004, I visited Lesotho and was heartbroken at the misery. I traveled for weeks high into the mountains, held workshops for hundreds of teachers, talked to thousands of children, and met with local chiefs, government officials, and the King of Lesotho. The courage and determination of the teachers and children was truly inspiring. I listened and learned what these amazing local heroes and youth felt would help their villages, schools and families. I was overwhelmed by the thought of these orphans, vulnerable children and their grandmother—caregivers feeling so alone and forgotten.

Although I had no prior experience in international development, my background in social work and educational psychology helped me to structure what I heard into culturally meaningful projects and programs delivered with kindness in the most sustainable ways. I was committed to providing the depth of psychosocial support that individuals need to deal with crushing poverty and despair.

As I began to tell the story to groups and colleagues, financial support initially came from friends, family, educators and neighbours. By 2005, the work was so extensive that I committed myself to it full-time – *Help Lesotho* was born. I spent three to four months each year in Lesotho deeply involved in program development and expansion. I held the grannies as they wept and listened to the children's fears and hopes. Local staff were carefully recruited and trained to be effective and accountable. Community leaders and local partnerships were engaged on a village, district and national level.

Young people changed before my eyes as they thrived with the encouragement, education, personal development, kindness and support. I believe with all my heart that it is possible for these precious lives to be healthier, self-reliant and fulfilled because of the work we do.

Help Lesotho's two community centres are especially wonderful places of hope. I stay committed to this country and this cause because I can see that our work is responsible, sustainable and locally valued. Our core priority of accountability ensures your funds are well directed, often several times over. I believe deeply in our local team and their incredible commitment to the work and the people we serve. Lives are changing and, while there is still a long way to go, Lesotho is coming back from the brink.

With the help of over 3500 donors from across Canada and in several other countries we have raised more than \$11M and enabled *Help Lesotho* to deliver a highly-valued diversity of integrated programs to change thousands of lives annually.





Bala Theresa Singareddy (Angèle) was born in Reddipalem, a village in the state of Telangana in India. During her youth, she studied in India, in the United States and in the Philippines. While in the Philippines, she met a Canadian – André Gingras – whom she married. In 1975, in their hometown of Limbour, Gatineau, Québec, they began to raise awareness amongst their friends and neighbors about the living conditions of people in India. These discussions led to the formation of a small group, "Partage Reddipalem", dedicated to sponsoring the education of poor children in India. In 1977, SOPAR was founded.

For the first 13 years of its existence, Angèle managed SOPAR as a volunteer from her own home. In 1990, she left for India with her husband who, after a 25-year career with the Canadian International Development Agency, took one last overseas posting. In India, Angèle devoted her time to creating a new organization – Bala Vikasa – aimed at ensuring the effective implementation of SOPAR's programs in India. In 1991, Bala Vikasa became a registered NGO with the Indian government. Since then, the two sister organizations have pursued a common objective: to support the development process of rural Indian communities. As a result of their vision, dedication and familiarity with the reality of India's rural areas, the founders were able to establish a model organization that has changed the lives of hundreds of thousands of people.

Captain Robert Piché, a 20-year Air Transat pilot with 45 years of aircraft experience, retired in October of 2017. This captain, made famous by his Azores landing in August of 2001 after an in-flight fuel outage, discovered his passion for aviation thanks to his desire to travel the world. On August 24, 2001, he was Captain of the Airbus 330-243 (C-GITS) flying Air Transat Flight 236 Montreal to Lisbon and managed to land the aircraft safely in the Azores after it lost all power due to fuel exhaustion. After graduation he worked for regional airlines until he was laid off by Quebecair. After being laid off, he worked odd jobs which consisted of smuggling marijuana to the United States by plane. In 1983, Piché served 16

months of a 10-year sentence in prison after a plane he landed solo at a small airfield in the state of Georgia was found to be full of marijuana smuggled from Jamaica. He was pardoned in 2000 and is considered fully rehabilitated. In 1996, at the age of 43, Air Transat hired Piché. He rose rapidly from co-pilot to captain on the Lockheed L-1011 Tristar and transitioned to the Airbus A330 in the spring of 2000. On October 1st, 2017, Piché flew his last commercial flight. He retired from commercial flying after piloting TS605 from Rome to Montréal. Although this was his last commercial flight, his very last flight for Air Transat took place on October 12th, 2017, when he flew C-GKTS, an A330-300 on a sightseeing flight from Montreal, over Quebec City and back to Montreal. The flight was a fundraiser for his foundation, "Le Fondation Robert Piché" which helps people with drug and alcohol addictions.
