ALBERTA CENTENNIAL MEDAL 2005

TERMS



The Alberta Centennial Medal celebrates Alberta's first 100 years by paying tribute to Albertans whose achievements have benefited their fellow citizens, their community and their province.

To ensure that the medal was inclusive and recognized a diversity of contributions, the criteria for nominations were broad. The medal was awarded to living men, women and youth who:

- have made significant contributions to their fellow citizens, their community and to Alberta, and
- are Canadian citizens that reside in, or have resided in, Alberta.

Representatives from provincial organizations, governments and other groups made the nominations.

DESCRIPTION

A circular medal, cast in bronze and plated in gold.



The Coat of Arms of Alberta in the centre with ALBERTA CENTENNIAL in an annulus at the top and 1905-2005 at the bottom.

REVERSE

A large maple leaf in the centre with the Provincial shield at its centre and in an annulus around the rim at the top HONOURING OUTSTANDING ALBERTANS

RIBBON

Blue edge, wider gold stripe, narrow green stripe, white stripe, narrow dark pink stripe, white stripe, narrow green stripe, wider gold stripe and blue edge. The colours of the medal's ribbon symbolize Alberta's spirit and strengths. Blue and gold, Alberta's provincial colours are most prominent in the ribbon.

All the colours in the ribbon are taken from Alberta's official emblems and heraldry.

Blue - clear skies and sparkling lakes

Gold - wheat fields and resource wealth

Green - forests

White - mountains

Pink - wild rose

MOUNTING

A bronze bar with a hole in the centre with a link through it attaching to a ring at the top of the medal.

DATE

The medal was established in March 2005.

ISSUED

Approximately 8,000 medals were issued.

COMMEMORATIVE MEDAL for the CENTENNIAL of SASKATCHEWAN 2005

TERMS



The Commemorative Medal for the Centennial of Saskatchewan (Saskatchewan Centennial Medal) is a one-time commemorative medal marking the province's 100th anniversary in 2005. The medal recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions to society and honours outstanding achievements.

Criteria for this medal are a broad range of contributions to the community and to the province through leadership, voluntarism, community involvement and outstanding personal achievements. Only individuals, not groups, can be nominated. Posthumous nominations are not accepted.

A certain number of individuals will receive the medal by virtue of their office, such as provincial and federal elected members, judges, Aboriginal leaders, and community and municipal leaders. Other recipients are selected based on the recommendation of governmental and non-governmental organizations and Members of the Legislative Assembly.

DESCRIPTION

A circular, bronze medal 36-mm in diameter.

OBVERSE

The provincial motto under a wreath of western red lilies, surmounted by the St. Edward's Crown. The words "SASKATCHEAN is around the top of the rim and 1905-2005 around the bottom of the rim.

REVERSE

The Saskatchewan shield of arms

RIBBON

A gold ribbon with two narrow green stripes.

ISSUED

Approximately 4,000 medals were presented by the Lieutenant Governor or her delegate at events held throughout Saskatchewan's Centennial year.

SASKATCHEWAN VOLUNTEER MEDAL SVM

(Province of Saskatchewan Award)

TERMS



Awarded by the Saskatchewan government to offer public recognition for those individuals who share with others the strong volunteer values of the province of Saskatchewan and who has provided, without reward or gain, outstanding volunteer service or exceptional community involvement in an area that is beyond the performance of the individual's normal duties or the exercise of the responsibilities of a profession to which the individual belongs.

All current residents or former long-term residents of the province are eligible other than elected federal or provincial representatives or members of the judiciary, who are not eligible while they are in office. Posthumous awards are not made.

Any individual, group of people, or organization can nominate somebody with the key question being: "has the person made a significant

contribution to the province through volunteer work".

A maximum of ten (10) medals are presented by the Lieutenant-Governor of Saskatchewan each year.

DESCRIPTION

A silver, circular medal designed by Mr. Jack Glasser of Regina.

OBVERSE

The Saskatchewan Shield of Arms surmounted by the Crown in red, green, black and white enamels is in the centre with the words in black NOS IPSOS DEDIMUS (we give of ourselves) around the top of the disc and SASKATCHEWAN around the bottom of the disc.

MOUNTING

A 'V' mounting attached to the bottom of a straight bar (V = Volunteer).

RIBBON

The 32-mm wide ribbon has three equal stripes of green, gold, and green.

OTHER

Recipients are also honoured with a lapel pin bearing the Saskatchewan Shield of Arms with the $\ensuremath{'V'}$.

ISSUED

245 to June 2022 (8 to 10 - now 12 per year presented in April of the following year.

Medals presented for the year 2000 (presented in 2001) were double the usual number because 2001 was the International Year of the Volunteer. The recipients for the previous year are announced in March of the following year (2015 recipients will be announced March 2016!)

DATES

The Medal was created in 1995 by the Saskatchewan Legislature and the first recipients received the medal in March 1996. The Government of Canada granted status to the Medal in the Official Precedence of Canadian Orders, Decorations and Medals by Privy Council Order 1998-591, 02 April 1998 and published in the Canada Gazette Part II, page 1446, 29 April 1998. ³

SASKATCHEWAN PROTECTIVE SERVICES MEDAL

Unofficial Medal (not in the Canadian Order of precedence)

TERMS



Established in 2003 to recognize exemplary long service for individuals working in a direct capacity to protect people and/or property, and supervisory personnel in the public service sectors who ensure the safety, security and protection of Saskatchewan citizens. These individuals set high standards and strive for excellence in their duties so everyone in Saskatchewan can live safe and secure lives. The Saskatchewan Protective Services Medal honours protective services providers and focuses attention on the efforts and work of police, fire and emergency professionals, and others working in the field of safety and security.

Nominees must be personnel with 25 years of service in Saskatchewan and actively employed in one of the eligible agencies on or after 1 January 2003, who have law enforcement

powers, or work in safety services and professions whose work is directly related to the safety, security and protection of people.

Unofficial Medal (not in the Canadian Order of precedence)

Recipients include personnel from: Fire Services; Police Services; Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA); Citizenship and Immigration Canada; Emergency Medical Services; Canadian Forces; Parks Wardens; Highways and Infrastructure's Transport Compliance Branch; Federal and Provincial Corrections; and Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs & Investigators, and Saskatchewan Justice's Safer Communities & Neighbourhoods Investigation Unit.

DESCRIPTION

A circular gold medal 38-mm in diameter, surmounted by the St. Edward's Crown which bears a shield with a lion on a stylized western red lily (in red enamel) and the motto *Qui civitatem tuentur* (who guard the citizenry) on the Obverse.

RIBBON

A 32-mm wide green ribbon of green with two narrow gold stripes (4-mm wide) set 7-mm from each edge.
